GENERAL INFORMATION - BOYS' AND GIRLS'

MANAGEMENT

In accordance with Article 32 of the CIF Southern Section By-Laws, all playoffs of the CIF Southern Section shall be under the management of the Commissioner of Athletics.

GAME RULES

All playoff games will be played under the 2001-2002 National Federation Basketball Rules, except where superseded by Blue Book rulings or this handbook.

PLAYOFF ENTRY AND SELECTION FORMAT

As adopted by the CIF Southern Section Council, **LEAGUE ENTRIES WILL BE LIMITED TO THE FOLLOWING:**

- 4 Team Leagues -- 2 Entries Guaranteed Only
- 5 Team Leagues -- 3 Entries Guaranteed Only
- 6 Team Leagues -- 3 Entries Guaranteed Only
- 7 Team Leagues -- 4 Entries Guaranteed Only
- 8 Team Leagues -- 4 Entries Guaranteed Only
- 9 Team Leagues -- 4 Entries Guaranteed Only

LEAGUE COORDINATORS WILL SUBMIT ENTRIES TO THE CIF-SS OFFICE NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M., SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 2002, ON THE FORM PROVIDED TO THEM.

Each championship divisional tournament bracket will be maintained at 16 and 32 team draws, depending on the number of entries submitted.

In divisions where there are more teams than the bracket will allow, "wild card" games will be played to reduce the field to accommodate the bracket.

IMPORTANT: <u>TO BE CONSIDERED FOR AN AT-LARGE BERTH, A TEAM MUST HAVE WON AT LEAST 11 GAMES FOR ITS COMPLETE SCHEDULE AND SUBMITTED AN AT-LARGE PETITION.</u>

SCHOOLS WISHING TO BE ENTERED AS AN AT-LARGE TEAM MUST SUBMIT A PETITION OF THEIR COMPLETED SCHEDULE ON THE FORM INCLUDED IN THIS MAILING NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M. ON SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 2002.

A selection committee will utilize the following information in its selection process, with each having no specific weight and/or order preference:

- a) Head-to-head competition of teams under consideration.
- b) Overall strength of the league in which the team participates.
- c) Overall won/loss record.
- d) League finish.
- e) Strength against common opponents.
- f) Strength of schedule.
- g) Strength at end of season (whether team has lost its last three games or won its last three games, etc.)
- h) Freelance teams will be part of the pool for the filling of "At Large" berths.

LEAGUE DESIGNATION OF ENTRIES

Each league will also be charged with the responsibility - as in all other sports - of designating a priority order for its member-school entries for pairing purposes. CIF-SS tournament management will place schools in the 16 or 32-team brackets based on league entry order and will follow established and accepted guidelines in pairing the tournament brackets.

FREE LANCE QUALIFICATION

Freelance schools interested in participating in the basketball playoffs should have submitted a schedule to the CIF-SS Office by November 19, 2001.

Game results must be faxed into the CIF-SS Office on a <u>regular</u> basis with the final call no later than noon, Thursday, February 7, 2002.

END OF COMPETITION

ALL LEAGUE COMPETITION FOR ENTRIES MUST BE COMPLETED ON OR BEFORE FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 2002. NO LEAGUE COMPETITION WILL BE ALLOWED ON SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 2002, AS PER BLUE BOOK RULE 1614.

PAIRINGS

It will be the responsibility of the Commissioner and his staff to establish the pairings in each first round game of all divisions.

PLAYOFF PAIRING FORMAT

SEEDS - The initial step is to designate four teams (maximum) as seeds, with No. 1 and No. 4 placed in the top bracket and No. 2 and No. 3 in the bottom bracket (see diagram 1). An exception to this procedure would be if seeds in the same half of the bracket are from the same league. If this occurs, using the example of the top half of the bracket, No. 4 would then become the No. 3 seed and No. 3 seed would fill the No. 4 position to separate the league representation. Note: A league No. 2 entry may not be seeded higher than a No. 1 entry from that league.

Is it possible to designate more than four seeds?

The task would be virtually impossible on two counts. Attempting to delineate which team is the No. 7 seed, as opposed to No. 8 or No. 12 rather than No. 13 would result in 25 different answers by 25 different people. Additionally, an attempt at a "true seed" would be in opposition to the CIF-SS Constitution and By-Laws, which specify a league's designated No. 1 entry shall meet a No. 3 entry and a No. 2 shall meet another No. 2 where the draw provides for same in the opening round.

FILLING THAT DRAW - The next stop is to fill the bracket draw and a simple guideline provides the ground rules for same. Assuming for the moment the top four seeds are all No. 1 teams, the procedure calls for the No. 2 teams from each of these leagues to be placed in the opposite half of the bracket (see Diagram 2).

Consider there are five leagues assigned to this particular bracket, it now becomes necessary to place the only league not represented thus far, League D. The No. 1 designee is placed in either half of the bracket, with League D #2 in the opposite half (See Diagram #3).

The final step is to place the No. 3 teams from each of the respective leagues in the open slots, attempting to place

each in one of the remaining "quarters" of the bracket where the league is not represented. This process eliminates the aspect of schools from the same league meeting in the second round of competition.

An exception to this procedure occurs where geography does not permit wide placement. The directive of the CIF Southern Section Council (from its meeting on March 13, 1980), directs schools be placed in the same half, and if necessary, quarter of the bracket, to curtail excessive travel, is followed.

Another factor utilized when formulating initial pairings, is to review the playoff bracket for the previous years, in an effort not to match identical teams which may have been paired the previous year or two years back. This would not preclude two leagues being matched in consecutive years, but with two different representative schools.

SPECIAL NOTE:

REMIND YOUR LEAGUE COORDINATOR – If two teams tie for first place in a league and are going to be placed in different playoff divisions, each will be allowed to take their #1 entry with them. Please indicate a tie with a "T" next to the place finish. The only time it will be necessary for leagues to determine their respective #1, #2, #3 and #4 entry is if the teams are playing in the SAME DIVISIONS. As an example, if School A and School B tied for first place in their league were going to the same playoff division, say IA, then the league would have to determine which school was the #1 and which was the #2 entry. However, if School A were going to IIA and School B were going to IIIA, then they could both go into their respective divisions carrying their #1 entry with them and the guarantee of a host game.

LEAGUE CHANGE OF ENTRY

Once the drawsheet has been finalized by the CIF Southern Section Office and then notification is received that a league has made a mistake in submitting the proper entries in order of priority, this Office will exchange positions of the schools involved in the bracket from that league. No other changes will be made.

The C-BED enrollment figures used for basketball in the state are those from the 2000 - 2001 school year.

DETERMINATION OF SITES

To decide who shall be the host team after the first round of competition will be the sole responsibility of the Commissioner. In cases where two teams are paired after the first round of the playoffs, the team having the fewest number of home games in playoff competition shall be designated as the host team. When both teams have had an equal number of home playoff contests, the Commissioner shall toss a coin to decide the host team. When a school has been designated as the host school for a playoff contest it shall (1) act in that capacity unless excused by the Commissioner and (2) be considered the host team regardless of where the game is being played. SPECIAL NOTE: Teams receiving a bye in the first round shall automatically be the host team in the next round of the playoffs.

The host school is charged with the responsibility of securing an adequate gymnasium for the holding of a basketball playoff contest. All sites must be approved by the Office of the Commissioner of Athletics. It is recommended that where available and when approved, playoff games shall be played in rent-free high school gymnasiums, but in cases where it is necessary to pay a rental fee for an outside gymnasium, such an arrangement must be approved by the Commissioner prior to the contest.

Competing schools are reminded that CIF-SS playoff basketball games, while they may be played at one school, are under the control of the CIF-SS. Both competing schools in any one game are given equal consideration in regard to seating. If, in the Commissioner's opinion, the host team gym is not large enough to accommodate the anticipated crowd, the host team will be required to reserve one-half of the gym's capacity for the visiting school's rooters.

GAME SITES

The Commissioner's Office has been delegated the authority to determine the sites of all basketball playoff contests. For all games other than those at The Pond - Anaheim Arena, Loyola Marymount University, or the Pyramid at Long Beach State, the office will be guided in this decision by the following factors: (1) size of courts, (2) lighting, (3) seating capacity as it relates to a specific contest, (4) parking facilities, (5) type of backboards, (6) press facilities available, (7) availability of an alternate gym in the area, (8) results of the most recent Basketball Facility Survey.

SPECIAL NOTE: In all divisions for BOTH boys and girls, the semifinal and championship games shall be played on ALTERNATE COURTS. For any playoff contest, the Commissioner may direct that the contest be played on an alternate court if the host court does not meet CIF-SS playoff standards or will not accommodate the anticipated crowd.

PRACTICE IN ALTERNATE GYMS

Whenever a playoff game is scheduled for an alternate gym, neither team will be permitted to practice in that gym prior to the contest. The visiting team may not practice prior to the game on its opponent's home court.

ALTERNATE GYM DEFINED

An alternate gym is defined as any site on which a team does not conduct regular practice. A team may schedule more than one game in the same gym, and the facility would still be considered an "alternate" gym as long as NO practice session was conducted in that facility. In games where a team is entitled to a host court, but its regular gym does not have adequate seating capacity to meet playoff standards and the game is ordered to be played at another facility, that team may conduct practice at this facility prior to the contest.

PLANNING MEETINGS

It is required that administrators from the two competing schools get together to discuss details connected with the staging of the contest. Visiting students and supporters should be given detailed information regarding the best method of reaching the site of the contest, where to park, where to enter the facility and where their allotted seats are located. The half-time entertainment and all activities connected with the game should be thoroughly worked out.

Special planning meetings will be held for those teams involved in games under the direct management of the Commissioner. Schools will be notified of the exact sites and times of the planning meetings.

GAME ARRANGEMENTS

With a very limited amount of time between each round of the playoffs, a tremendous strain is placed on the staff at the CIF-SS Office in arranging the details connected with insuring a successful playoff activity. Game sites must be established, officials secured, tickets mailed, press credentials issued, and press releases distributed. To expedite matters, our staff will be in the office on Saturday and Sunday, February 16-17 and each Saturday and Sunday morning following games thereafter during the playoffs.

We would like an official representative from the winning school to contact our office the day following their game for the purpose of confirming arrangements for the next playoff game and the picking up of tickets.

Winners in each round of the playoffs must be ready the next morning to give to the CIF-SS Office their selected playing site for the next round should they be the host school.

GAME MANAGEMENT FORMS

Each school having a possibility of qualifying for the basketball playoffs will be sent a Playoff Game Management Form. This form will provide our office with necessary information concerning either your host gymnasium or a nearby facility where you may be conducting a playoff game. The information submitted will be carefully reviewed and schools will be notified if approval is not granted to conduct a game at the facility listed.

STATE BASKETBALL PLAYOFFS

The 2001-2002 CIF Regional and State basketball playoffs in March will be conducted in five divisions for both boys and girls.

Schools will be divided into the five divisions by enrollment. Division I will consist of schools with enrollments totaling above 1,700; Division II 1,351 - 1,699; Division III 816 - 1,350; Division IV 191 - 815 and Division V 190 and below. Single-gender school will double enrollment.

All divisions, both boys and girls contests, will be conducted on March 6, 9 and 16 to determine the 2002 State Southern Regional Champion.

The State Finals will be played on Friday and Saturday, March 22 & 23, 2002 at the ARCO Arena in Sacramento.

A comprehensive bulletin will be forwarded to all competing schools at a later date.

SPECIAL NOTE: Only teams advancing to the Southern Section Championships will advance to the State Finals. (FOUR TEAMS IN EACH STATE DIVISION.)

Schools advancing to the State Tournament will be able to pick up their State packets at the CIF Southern Section Office on Monday, March 4, 2002 after 9:00 a.m.

All games in the playoffs will be played at 7:30 p.m. PERMISSION MUST BE SECURED FROM THE COMMISSIONER FOR ANY CHANGE IN SITE, TIME OR DAY OF CONTEST.

SPECIAL NOTES:

- 1. In all divisions, the semifinal and championship games shall be played on ALTERNATE COURT sites For any playoff contest, the Commissioner may direct that the contest be played on an alternate court if the host court does not meet CIF-SS playoff standards or will not accommodate the anticipated crowd.
- 2. IF TEAMS FROM THE SAME SCHOOL GEOGRAPHICAL AREA ADVANCE TO THE FINALS, THE PRINCIPALS (WITH CIF-SS OFFICE APPROVAL) MAY MOVE THE GAME TO THEIR RESPECTIVE AREA. ADDITIONALLY, THE CIF-SS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO SHIFT CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES DEPENDING ON TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS AND SCHOOL LOCATION.

GAME ADMINISTRATION INFORMATION BOYS' AND GIRLS'

EQUAL FACILITIES

Although it is necessary that one team be designated as the host team, it shall be kept in mind that the game belongs to both competing schools and facility seating must be split equally. A pre-game planning meeting must be conducted to plan all details connected with the staging of every playoff contest.

ELIGIBILITY LISTS

Eligibility lists are no longer required to be exchanged by competing schools. However, one eligibility list, which will suffice for the entire playoff duration, **must** be sent to the CIF-SS Office **prior to the first playoff game.**

SQUAD SIZE

Each school participating in the CIF Southern Section Basketball Playoffs will be permitted to suit up not more than 17 players.

GAME JERSEYS

The host team shall wear light-colored jerseys and the visiting team dark-colored jerseys, for all playoff contests. If a team has only one set of jerseys, it will be that school's responsibility to notify its opponent in sufficient time in advance of any scheduled contest, so that proper arrangements can be made to make certain that both teams have contrasting colored jerseys.

GAME BALL

The game ball to be used in all CIF Southern Section Basketball Playoff games will be a LEATHER BALL provided by the host team. The **SPALDING TF-1000 • 61-105 (boys') and TF-1000 28.5 • 61-107 (womens')** will be the ball used for all championship final games.

GAME OFFICIALS

Officials for all playoff games will be coordinated through the CIF-SS Office and the Assignment Coordinator. In games leading to the championship game, each official shall receive \$61. In championship games, each official will receive \$69.

Mileage fees, due to excess travel distance, will be confirmed by the assignment coordinator. Officials will be appointed, whenever possible, from neutral officials' associations. You will be notified of your officials in advance and we ask that you DO NOT call the CIF-SS Office due to the heavy phone traffic during playoffs. However, if the host school has not been advised regarding officials by 12 noon on game day, please contact Ken Wilson, (310) 376-5118.

SCHOOLS ARE <u>NOT</u> TO MAKE ARRANGEMENTS FOR THEIR OWN OFFICIALS.

OFFICIAL SCORER AND CLOCK OPERATOR

The official scorer and clock operators are recognized as game officials and it is required that a faculty member or other qualified responsible **ADULT** staff these important positions.

CHECK TIMER

The check timer for playoff games shall be a faculty member or responsible adult. If the visiting team does not supply a check timer, the host team facility timer alone is responsible.

35/30 SECOND CLOCKS

The 35-second clock shall be used for all boys' basketball contests and the 30-second clock shall be used for all girls' basketball contests. A visible clock is highly recommended for all playoff contests.

The announcer should be a responsible adult who can set the tone of the game by calling the fans' attention to the following points of reference:

- 1. CIF-SS playoff contests are conducted under the strictest code of good sportsmanship.
- 2. The officials are neutral individuals, representing the Commissioner and have been selected because of demonstrated ability.
- 3. Rooters are encouraged to support their own team and are requested to display proper sportsmanship with respect to the visiting school and the officials. The CIF-SS appreciates your attendance and support of high school basketball.

MECHANICAL NOISEMAKERS

No mechanical noisemakers (horns, bells, victory bells, sirens, chimes, musical instruments other than those in the band, etc.) will be permitted inside the gymnasium at any CIF-SS Basketball game (practice, league, tournaments or playoff). Cheering devices such as wooden blocks, balloons, or other similar objects, are prohibited. Megaphones shall be used only by uniformed cheerleaders for the purpose of directing and controlling rooting sections. The improper use of any of the above listed devises by supporters of a team would subject that team to possible forfeiture of the contest.

PEP BAND, CHEERING SQUADS

If the host school has a band of not more than 12 members capable of contributing to the entertainment, there is no objection to having it play before games and during intermissions. Under no circumstances may the band instruments be used for cheering purposes. **Electronic amplification is prohibited.**

Even though additional members of the band purchase tickets, not more than 12 members may comprise the pep band. Because a number of gymnasiums have poor acoustics, it has been necessary to limit the number of players in a pep band. The noise generated by a large band in a gym with poor acoustics is annoying to spectators and distracting to players.

No band, other than the one from the host school, shall be admitted as an organization except by special permission of the Commissioner, who will act upon petition by the principal of the host school. **Under no circumstances may more than 12 members comprise a pep band.**

Members of an authorized pep, yell and/or song squad from both competing schools shall be admitted free of charge if in uniform and accompanied by an adult supervisor.

SPECIAL NOTE: For all championship games, school pep bands will be allowed no more than 21 members and school pep squads will be allowed no more than 12 uniformed members.

POSTERS AND BANNERS

Posters and banners are an excellent way of creating good sportsmanship between competing schools. Only those posters and banners exhibiting this concept will be permitted.

BODY DECORATION

Painted faces and/or markings and painting on any part of the body will NOT be allowed at CIF Southern Section basketball playoff activities.

PROTESTS

By action of the CIF-SS Council, protests of playoff contests involving National Federation rules will no longer be entertained following the conclusion of the contest.

Coaches may direct questions to the game officials as they pertain to a possible misapplication of the rules in accordance with the National Federation rules governing that sport. No protest may be carried forth once the contest is complete.

Coaches are encouraged to carry National Federation rule books with them for all playoff contests.

Schools will still have the opportunity to protest a contest in accordance with Southern Section rules, Rule 1111, as it pertains to use of ineligible player or violations of any CIF-SS rule in accordance with the contest.

TICKETS

For games under the direct control of the Commissioner's Office, tickets will be issued to competing schools in accordance with their request. Unsold reserved seats for games in all divisions played at the Pond - Anaheim Arena must be brought to the Pond - Anaheim Arena by an official representative of the school prior to the opening of ticket windows on the day of the game, so that the tickets might be placed on general sale.

AWARDS

CIF-SS regulations provide for seventeen individual patches to be furnished to members of the championship team in each playoff division. Runner-up teams will receive seventeen individual medals.

Schools desiring to purchase additional medals may order same from John McKinney, Herff Jones Inc., (714) 447-0011. Additional championship patches can be ordered from Jud Wood, Sales Representatives, Neff Corporation (949) 498-2013.

Each member of a team participating in the CIF Southern Section Basketball Playoffs will receive a CIF-SS awards certificate stating that they have participated in the CIF Southern Section Basketball Playoffs. These awards will be distributed as soon as possible during the playoffs. A limited number of additional certificates will be available for sale at a minimal cost through the CIF-SS Office and will be distributed according to priority of requests received from those schools desiring extra certificates.

The championship and runner-up team in each division will each receive a CIF-SS permanent trophy which will be retained by the school.

Team and individual awards will be presented immediately following each boys' and girls' championship contest.

SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS

Each year, the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association (SCIBCA) honors outstanding coaches for their contribution to high school basketball in Southern California. Time is provided during the evening of the championship games for this presentation.

When deemed appropriate, the CIF-SS honors people who have made contributions to its interscholastic program. In addition, many former outstanding CIF-SS championship teams are recognized. Time is provided during the evening double-header at the championship game for these presentations.

GAME RESULTS (Cont.)

The official representative of a school WINNING a playoff game must contact the CIF-SS Office between 8:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. the morning following each playoff game. With many games being played on Friday and Saturday nights, we would like an official representative from the winning school to contact our Office the following day for the purpose of confirming arrangements for the next playoff game.

Winners in each round of the playoffs must be ready to give to the CIF-SS Office their selected playing site for the next round, should they be the host team.

The coin flips, where necessary, are conducted by the Commissioner at 9:00 a.m. the day following all playoff contests in the lobby of the CIF Southern Section Office. If any coaches or a representative from the schools desire to be present, they are most cordially invited to attend.

FINANCIAL FORM - PROFIT

The following are instructions for filling out a financial form for a PROFIT game.

ALL FINANCIAL REPORTS MUST BE SUBMITTED WITHIN 10 DAYS AFTER COMPLETION OF CONTEST!

- 1. Schools are expected to submit only exact expenditures, within the maximums established. (i.e., all security costs exceeding \$200.00 must have CIF-SS approval.)
- 2. All meal allowance and lodging expenses must be cleared **PRIOR TO** the game with the CIF-SS Office. Three meals will only be approved when lodging is approved. See Meals and Lodging on Page 36 for details.
- 3. Travel allowance is permitted using these figures:
 - \$0.75 per mile for chartered or school bus. \$0.25 per mile for private automobile. (Limit 3 cars)
- 4. All travel expenses must be submitted to host school by visiting school within one (1) week of a contest. If expenses are not received in that time span, host school will submit a report MINUS ANY TRANSPORTATION AND MEAL COSTS which will then be absorbed by the visiting school.
- 5. Actual cost of bus rental is <u>NOT</u> an allowable expense. Auto Club figures may be used for mileage purposes.
- 6. Checks for profit split must be submitted to visitor and the CIF-SS Office by host school within ten (10) days of contest. Checks are to include 1/4 profit plus any reimbursed allowed expenses to the visiting school and 1/2 profit to CIF Southern Section.
- 7. Ticket control sheet must accompany financial report.

FINANCIAL FORM - LOSS

The following are instructions for filling out a financial form for a LOSS game.

ALL FINANCIAL REPORTS MUST BE SUBMITTED WITHIN 10 DAYS AFTER COMPLETION OF CONTEST!

- 1. Schools are expected to submit only exact expenditures, within the maximums established. (i.e., all security costs exceeding \$200.00 must have CIF-SS approval.)
- 2. All meal allowance and lodging expenses must be cleared **PRIOR TO** the game with the CIF-SS Office. Three meals will only be approved when lodging is approved. See Meals and Lodging on Page 36 for details.
- 3. Travel allowance is permitted using these figures:
 - \$0.75 per mile for chartered or school bus.
 - \$0.25 per mile for private automobile. (Limit 3 cars)
- 4. All travel expenses must be submitted to host school by visiting school within one (1) week of a contest. If expenses are not received in that time span, host school will submit a report MINUS ANY TRANSPORTATION AND MEAL COSTS which will then be absorbed by the visiting school.
- 5. Actual cost of bus rental is <u>NOT</u> an allowable expense. Auto Club figures may be used for mileage purposes.
- 6. The game <u>net loss</u> is absorbed equally be the two schools. In order to distribute the funds, subtract 1/2 the net loss from each school's expenses as shown on the financial report. The <u>amount remaining</u> should be sent in the form of a check to the visiting school along with the report. The home school keeps the remaining amount left for its expenses. These two net figures will add up to be the same as the total receipts for the game. (See Example.) A copy of the report should be sent to the CIF-SS Office, which receives no money in the case of a loss. REPORTS MUST BE SUBMITTED BY THE HOME SCHOOL WITHIN TEN (10) DAYS OF THE CONTEST.
- 7. Ticket control sheet <u>must</u> accompany financial report.

FINANCIAL REGULATIONS BOYS AND GIRLS

RESPONSIBILITY

The principal of each school participating in the CIF Southern Section Basketball Playoffs shall be responsible to see that prescribed procedures pertaining to playoff regulations, as outlined in this section, are followed. If the principal so desires, this responsibility may be delegated to a member of his/her staff.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The CIF-SS Executive Committee has required that the host school charge admission to boys' and girls' player contests. (See financial policy Article 1, Section 140-147, CIF-SS Blue Book, pages 47.)

The host school will account for the revenue from the game, pay all expenses for the game, and compile the financial report (supplied by the CIF-SS Office), sending one copy each to the visiting school and the CIF-SS Office. Net profits from all games shall be split one-fourth to each school and one-half to the CIF-SS. Please remit to CIF-SS a check only. DO NOT SEND CASH!!

Any loss will be split equally by the two schools. Schools are expected to submit only the exact expenditures. In all cases these expenses shall be within the maximum established. All receipts and expenses from both schools are to be listed on the financial report with the net loss figure shown at the bottom. This amount is to be split equally in half, and then deducted from each school's expenses, thus giving a proportionate share of the loss to each school.

SPECIAL NOTE: Financial reports **MUST** be submitted within **ONE WEEK** after the contest. As provided in CIF-SS Blue Book Rule 145. After a reasonable request from the Commissioner's Office, schools that continue to be delinquent with financial reports will not be allowed to host a game during the playoffs in all sports for a period of <u>one year</u>.

TRAVEL EXPENSE STATEMENT

The visiting school will pay its own traveling expenses and forward a statement of these expenses to the financial manager of the host school for reimbursement. If expenses are known in advance, this statement should be brought to the game-otherwise within three (3) school days following the game. These expenses would include mileage for transportation and lodging and/or meals where approved. Traveling expenses of the visiting team are considered part of the game expenses.

ALLOWABLE TRAVEL EXPENSES

The CIF-SS Council has set the allowable travel expense as it pertains to Boys' and Girls' Basketball only. Traveling squads shall be limited to a maximum of 17 in the party, including players, coaches, manager, an administrators. Schools may take additional personnel if they wish, but at their own expense. A maximum of \$0.7 per mile round trip will be approved for either chartered or school bus transportation. The maximum allowance for private automobile transportation (limit of three cars) would be \$0.25 per mile, per car, round trip.

It is the intent to encourage schools to utilize private automobile transportation when possible in an effort to keep the travallowance at a minimum and possible financial loss to schools involved. Please pass this information along to the person your campus charged with completing the financial report form.

MEALS AND LODGING

No allowance will be permitted for meals or lodging without prior approval of the CIF-SS Office. This is necessary in insure uniform expenditures for all schools. Where approved, maximums are \$1.50 for breakfast, \$2.50 for lunch, \$5.00 for dinner for a party of 17. The number of meals allowed a school will be determined by the CIF-SS Office on the basis of distance traveled and the scheduled time of the game. No meals will be authorized when the travel distance is less than 140 miles round trip. Mileage must be verified by contacting the CIF Southern Section. Where lodging is authorized, the maximum shall be \$6.00 per person for a group of not more than 17. No lodging will be permitted unless the distance is over 550 miles round trip.

TELEPHONE CALLS

Telephone calls will not be listed as game expense. Both competing schools and the CIF-SS Office will pay for all calls from their share of the game receipts.

CONCESSIONS AND PROGRAMS

Where concessions and programs are involved in a playoff contest, the profit or loss from such enterprises shall not be included in the financial report. The host school reserves the right to handle the program and concessions as a separate venture and need not share the profit nor expect the CIF-SS or the visiting school to share in any loss.

The CIF-SS Office will publish the program for all games under its direct management. All revenue from the sale of these programs will be separate from game income.

GAME PERSONNEL

The host management is responsible for staffing the gymnasium with the personnel necessary to conduct the contest. It would be expected that the same pay schedule followed for league contests would be used to reimburse ticket sellers, ticket takers, police, physician and custodial help. In determining the pay scale for working personnel in playoff games, schools are reminded that it should be computed on the basis of **one contest** instead of **two games** as is customary in regular league play.

GAME PERSONNEL (Continued)

In playoffs contests, payment to faculty personnel to supervise a rooting section is not an allowable expense and may not be charged to game expense. It is realized that some schools pay faculty persons to supervise rooting sections in league contests, but because this is not the policy in many schools, the Executive Committee has ruled that if a school (host or visitor) desires to pay such personnel, it shall do so out of its share of the net receipts and not charge the cost to the game expense.

There is a wide disparity of staffing policies for athletic contests among schools in the Southern Section. Because of this, schools in the playoffs are asked to assign the minimum number of personnel necessary to assure efficiency and safety.

GATE PROCEDURES

All schools hosting playoff games should make certain that gate personnel handling tickets are advised of the following procedures:

- 1. All tickets presented for admission are to be torn in half to prevent further use.
- 2. All tickets are to be checked for appropriate color. This is to prevent someone from entering with a ticket designated for another game or with a ticket that was used for the previous playoff round. This also prevents an adult from entering with a student ticket, a student with a child's ticket, etc.
- 3. All ticket-takers and gate personnel should familiarize themselves with the CIF-SS Press Pass, CIF-SS Photo Pass and CIF-SS Courtesy Card.

ADMISSION OF WORKING FACULTY PERSONNEL

BOTH SCHOOLS: Only those regular faculty personnel from the competing schools who have been assigned definite supervisory responsibilities for the playoff game will be admitted free of charge. No other administrators, counselors, faculty or staff members will be admitted without a complimentary or general admission ticket.

HOST SCHOOL: The host school shall submit its designated number of working faculty personnel (i.e., supervisors for reserved seat areas or rooting sections, and other related assignments) as part of the Game Management Form which is required by the CIF-SS Office prior to each scheduled playoff game.

VISITING SCHOOL: The visiting school shall submit its list of working faculty personnel (i.e., supervisors for rooters buses and rooting sections) directly to the host school prior to the date of the game, with a copy to be forwarded to the CIF-SS Office for attachment to the appropriate Game Management Form.

COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

Each school participating in the CIF-SS Basketball Playoffs will receive an allotment of 15 general admission tickets for each game in which they compete. If additional tickets are desired, they must be purchased at the prevailing rate by the school. Drivers of team and rooter buses must be provided with tickets by the school; they will not be admitted without a ticket. These tickets are also to be used for scouting purposes.

COURTESY CARDS AND PASSES

CIF-SS Courtesy Cards will be honored for all basketball playoff contests **EXCEPT THE CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS**. Courtesy cards from other sections and officials' association passes are not valid for admission at any CIF-SS playof contest.

NO SCHOOL, LEAGUE, DISTRICT, OR LOCAL NEWSPAPER PASSES WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR ADMISSION TO PLAYOFF GAMES REGARDLESS OF LEAGUE POLICIES GOVERNING THIS MATTER.

CIF-SS press and photographer's credentials (see Media Section) issued by the Commissioner's Office, the State C Courtesy Card and the State CIF Life Pass are the only credentials to be honored for admission to basketball playoff contests. SPECIAL NOTE: STATE CIF MEDIA PASSES ARE NOT TO BE ACCEPTED FOR SOUTHERN SECTION PLAYOFF CONTESTS.

TICKET SALES

Ticket sales for all games, except those under the direct management of the Commissioner's Office, will be controlled by competing schools, with the school designated as the host school responsible for ticket accounting for the game.

Tickets for each host school will not be provided by the CIF-SS Office unless specifically requested. Drivers of team and rooter buses must be provided with tickets by the school. They will not be admitted without a ticket.

GUIDELINES FOR TICKET SELLERS

- 1. Do not accept cash in large bills unless absolutely necessary.
- 2. Check large bills for authenticity. Hold it up to the light. \$100 bills will have a vertical marking as well as a facial picture off to one side. Counterfeit bills do not have this water mark.
- 3. Do not accept personal checks.

BOYS' AND GIRLS' PRE-GAME SALE AT VISITING SCHOOL

Each visiting school will be provided, upon request to the CIF-SS Office, with student pre-game sale tickets. NO TICKETS WILL BE ISSUED TO A SCHOOL AUTOMATICALLY: THEY MUST BE REQUESTED. **THE PRE-GAME SALE STUDENT TICKETS ARE TO BE SOLD ONLY FOR STUDENTS IN THE SCHOOL.** General admission tickets for pre-game sale may be secured upon request. Although these tickets will be issued to the visiting school directly from the CIF-SS Office, the accounting of these tickets will be made to the host school. As soon as possible, (preferably the night of the game), the visiting school should send the following items to the financial manager of the host school: 1) All unsold tickets; 2) Complete report for all advance ticket sales; 3) Check for the total amount of ticket sales; 4) Statement of travel expenses, including mileage for transportation and lodging and/or meals where approved.

TICKET PRICES

For games in all divisions, students from the competing schools will have an opportunity to purchase, at pre-game sale, a STUDENT TICKET good for admission. If a student does not purchase a pre-game sale ticket at their school, they must pay the adult price at the game.

NOTE: High school students from non-participating schools and junior high school students must pay the general admission price. They will be unable to use student pre-game tickets.

MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS CREDENTIALS

CIF-SS Press and Photo Credentials issued by the CIF-SS Office will be honored at all CIF-SS basketball playoff games, with the exception of games managed by the CIF-SS.

Members of the Media are urged to contact host schools and request press accommodations in advance of scheduled games. There will be occasions when this is not possible; therefore the host school is requested to make every effort to arrange suitable seating for the Media covering the event.

In contests directly managed by the CIF-SS, special press and photo credentials will be issued to working members of the Media who request them. Media credential requests should be made in writing at least one week in advance of the contest. RADIO BROADCASTS

Radio stations planning to broadcast basketball playoff games MUST request prior permission from the CIF-SS Office. Stations shall first secure permission from BOTH schools involved and then contact the CIF-SS Office for approval. For playoff games, other than championship finals, and games managed by the CIF-SS at the Pond - Anaheim Arena and the Pyramid at California State University, Long Beach, a rights fee of \$150 for boys' Division I, II or III, \$100 for boys' Division IV or V, and \$75 for girls' must be submitted DIRECTLY TO THE CIF-SS OFFICE prior to the contest. For championship games and those managed directly by the CIF-SS the fee is \$125 for girls' and \$200 for boys' Division I or III and \$150 for Division IV or V. Rights fees for radio broadcasts are to be filed directly with the CIF-SS Office and are not to be included as part of the financial report.

There will be no fee charged for periodic progress reports by a radio station at various times during a playoff game, provided there are no more than six of these reports for any one game. The length of such reports shall not exceed two minutes and the reports may not include play-by-play descriptions of live action.

TELEVISION COVERAGE

The CIF-SS Office retains the broadcasting rights for all telecasts of playoffs contests and permission for same must be secured from the Commissioner who will have the sole authority to approve the telecast a minimum of one week in advance.

Delayed telecasts of CIF-SS playoff games are permissible but may not be aired prior to 9:30 p.m. on the date of the contest. The fee for a delayed telecast by any station is \$500 for boys' Division I, II and III and \$400 for boysDivision IV and V for non-championship playoff contests. The fee for a delayed telecast by any station is \$300 for all divisions girls non-championship playoff contests. For championship games the fee will be \$700 for boys' Division I, II and III and \$600 for boys' Division IV and V. For girls' championship games the fee will be \$400.

Consideration for any LIVE TELECAST will necessitate advance contractual negotiations with the CIF-SS Office. (Contact Thom Simmons)

TELEVISION COVERAGE (Continued)

Television rights fees will be paid DIRECTLY TO THE CIF-SS OFFICE IN ADVANCE of each contest to be broadcast. Rights fees for television broadcasts are to be filed directly with the CIF-SS Office and are not to be included as part of the financial report. To obtain approval for playoff game telecasts of any type, broadcasters must secure permission from BOTH schools involved before approval can be granted by the CIF-SS Office. Television rights fees must be paid for coverage of any CIF-SS playoff contest regardless of commercial/non-commercial intent of the broadcast.

News reports, film/video tape of any CIF-SS playoff contest is permissible to produce and telecast without payment of fees as long as the intent of such reports is for news reports only and do not contain extended play-by-play descriptions of live action.

AUDIO AND VIDEO REPRODUCTION EQUIPMENT

All CIF-SS playoff contests are copyrighted events of the CIF Southern Section. Any rebroadcast, live or delayed by any medium, will be subject to a rights clearance from the CIF Southern Section Office prior to the contest. No retransmission or video reproduction is permissible without the expressed, written consent of the CIF Southern Section.

PASSES AND PRESS CREDENTIALS

Pass gate personnel shall be instructed to honor the white/blue/gold CIF-SS Courtesy Card, gold CIF-SS Life Membership Pass, AND the blue/white CIF-SS Press Pass issued to members of the working press. The red/white CIF-SS Photo Pass will also be honored. No other type of pass issued by schools or leagues shall be honored for admission. Faculty personnel with supervisory responsibilities for the game from either school shall be admitted in accordance with the procedures listed in this handbook.

STATE CIF PASS

The State CIF has issued two types of passes which are to be honored at all events, a magenta Courtesy Card and a Gold Life Pass.

COURTESY AND PRESS CARDS

The white/blue/gold CIF-SS Courtesy Card for 2001-2002 shall be honored for admission to basketball playoff contests.

SPECIAL NOTE: The CIF-SS Courtesy Card will <u>NOT</u> be VALID for the championship finals at <u>ANY</u> site.

The news media will be issued special credentials for the championship games played at The Pond - Anaheim Arena, and the Pyramid at Long Beach State. The red/white Press Card for 2001-2002 and the orange/white Photo Pass for 2001-2002 are to be **honored at all other playoff games.**
